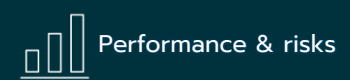

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## ▶ Investment commentary

In April, OFI Invest ESG Global Emerging Bond Opportunities posted a return of 1.24% thanks to a broad-based rebound in EM local currency assets. The top performers were Hungary (up 12.00%), Brazil (up 4.24%) and South Africa (up 4.05%), which together made the largest positive contribution to monthly performance. This rebound brought year-to-date performance into positive territory at +0.68%, reversing previous weakness in EM assets.

Throughout the month, the portfolio had to contend with a more challenging macroeconomic environment, with higher energy prices and renewed geopolitical volatility weighing on the asset class. Against this backdrop, active country selection and the portfolio's overweights in Hungary, South Africa, Mexico and Brazil were key to alpha generation.

The Hungarian election on 12 April 2026 saw Péter Magyar's pro-EU Tisza party win a landslide victory with around 53% of the vote and a two-thirds majority in parliament, ending Viktor Orbán's 16-year reign. This change unlocks frozen EU funds with a potential value of €20 billion and improves Hungary's relations with the EU. The main contributor to performance was the more than 100 bps tightening of the local yield spread in hopes of convergence with core eurozone yields.

Central banks in Latin America – particularly Brazil, Chile and Colombia – made the expected rate decisions as yield curves widened across the region. Brazil's Copom cut rates by 25 bps to 14.50% and adopted a cautious outlook, revising up its Q4 2027 inflation forecast to 3.5%. Chile's BCCh adopted a case-by-case approach, holding rates at 4.50%, causing the curve to widen slightly. Colombia's BanRep surprised markets by voting unanimously to hold rates at 11.25%, despite earlier signs of tightening and the fact that hikes were already expected even before post-election momentum favoured Cepeda over Valencia.

The future inclusion of Saudi Arabia and the Philippines in J.P. Morgan's emerging market bond indices is a major structural shift for emerging market debt investors. The country cap for index constituents has also been lowered by 1%, to 9%.

Our portfolio remained focused on markets where real yields remain attractive, domestic policy is relatively more credible and valuations offer protection against external volatility. Practically speaking, this favoured a selective approach to higher-yielding Latin American markets while maintaining a cautious approach in countries where monetary vulnerability, fiscal uncertainty or less effective policy transmission could leave local yield curves and currencies more exposed to further revaluations.

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Glossary

ALPHA	Alpha is equal to the average return on the product, i.e. the value added by the manager after deducting market influences over which the manager has no control. This calculation is expressed as a percentage.	BETA	Beta is an indicator of a fund's sensitivity relative to its benchmark. A fund with a beta of less than 1 is likely to fall less than its benchmark, while a fund with a beta of greater than 1 is likely to fall further than its benchmark.	RECOVERY PERIOD	The recovery period (expressed in days) is the number of days needed to recoup the losses incurred after a maximum loss is sustained. Maximum loss is the largest loss the fund has experienced.
AVERAGE SPREAD	A fund's average spread is the average yield spread between the bonds held by the fund and a benchmark (often government bonds). It reflects the amount of risk taken by the fund relative to securities considered risk-free.
