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

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### ▶ Investment commentary

Nothing could dampen the rise in European equity indices (the situation was different in the US, where indices did not rise) – not even the prospect of AI-fuelled dystopias, the build-up of US weaponry around Iran or the Supreme Court’s decision to overturn Donald Trump’s reciprocal tariffs. Index volatility belied an apparent calm, with index components shifting violently and divergent performance contrasting with last year’s polarisation. Of course, there were the expected winners and losers from AI. However, there was a notable increase in the number of sectors contributing to the rise, with various themes around AI “anti-fragility” in the energy, commodities, telecoms, food retail and real estate sectors. Many of the stocks concerned also benefited from the sharp decline in long rates in February. Earnings releases confirmed most activity trends, including in particular the health of the banking sector and strong demand for data centres. Winter weather significantly affected construction in the US (snowstorms) and Europe (floods), once again highlighting the need for economies to adapt to climate change. Often violent price fluctuations in response to earnings and 2026 outlooks say more about investors’ positioning than they do about the impact on valuations, which often diverge from fundamentals.

The portfolio outperformed the Stoxx 600 ex-UK NDR in the month.

Stock selection made the difference over the period, with strong contributions from the portfolio’s high-conviction stocks, for once across a variety of sectors: Technip Energies rallied after the company won new contracts, while AstraZeneca, Infineon, Siemens Energy, Schneider Electric and Knorr-Bremse were all buoyed by strong results, resulting in upgrades to their earnings forecasts. Conversely, momentum has yet to reverse for a few attractively valued stocks such as Dassault Systèmes (poor results but we note a favourable change in governance), Wolters Kluwer (AI has not marginalised its products) and Novo Nordisk (disappointing clinical trials). Vestas also lost ground as its recent strong run ran out of steam as a result of cautious messaging from management.

During the month, we bought more Vestas after an excessive decline and more Heineken on encouraging figures and an overly depressed valuation. Meanwhile, we took profits on a few positions that had put in very strong performances – such as Prysmian and Sandvik, whose valuations have tightened – and sold some SGS and Symrise, which lack catalysts.

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Glossary

<p><b>ALPHA</b></p> <p>Alpha is equal to the average return on the product, i.e. the value added by the manager after deducting market influences over which the manager has no control. This calculation is expressed as a percentage.</p>	<p><b>BETA</b></p> <p>Beta is an indicator of a fund's sensitivity relative to its benchmark. A fund with a beta of less than 1 is likely to fall less than its benchmark, while a fund with a beta of greater than 1 is likely to fall further than its benchmark.</p>	<p><b>RECOVERY PERIOD</b></p> <p>The recovery period (expressed in days) is the number of days needed to recoup the losses incurred after a maximum loss is sustained. Maximum loss is the largest loss the fund has experienced.</p>
<p><b>SRR</b></p> <p>The SRR (Synthetic Risk &amp; Reward Indicator: Risk indicator based on the volatility over a period of 260 weeks). Historic data such as those used to calculate the synthetic indicator may not be a reliable indication of the future risk profile. In particular, it proposes a typology to better identify assets falling under the banner of sustainable finance, notably through three categories: Article 6, Article 8 and Article 9 funds.</p>	<p><b>SRI</b></p> <p>The SRI (Synthetic Risk Indicator) provides an assessment of the product's risk relative to that of other products. It indicates the probability of the product incurring losses in the event of market movements or of us not being able to pay you. The risk indicator assumes that you will hold the product for the minimum recommended investment period.</p>
<p><b>SIX FINANCIAL STAR RATING</b></p> <p>The rating is based on the analysis of the return and risk of each fund within its Europe performance category, using a minimum three-year track record. A score is calculated by comparing the fund's performance and volatility with those of its category index, and then converted into a number of stars according to a quintile ranking. A "junior" rating is applied to funds with a two- to three-year history, by linking their performance to their category index to reach the required three years.
