
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▶ Performance over time⁽¹⁾ (base: 100 at 01/29/2021)

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▶ Investment commentary

OFI Invest ESG Global Emerging Bond Opportunities gained 1.32% in EUR in January (up 2.49% in USD). The top performers in January were Latin American markets such as Brazil (up 5.73%), Chile (up 4.26%) and Colombia (up 4.20%), mainly thanks to strong currency momentum since Q4.

Brazil gained ground after the central bank kept the Selic rate at 15.00%, signalling the start of a rate cut cycle at its forthcoming meeting. It also launched a repurchase operation and shifted towards external issues (denominated in US dollars) in its 2026 plan. The local yield curve has stabilised despite polls showing Lula leading in the 2026 presidential election.

Meanwhile, Chile's central bank held interest rates at 4.25%, their lowest since 2022. Slowing inflation, record copper prices and growing investor confidence are all positive factors. December GDP bounced back strongly (up 1.7% YoY), with the trade component up 2.3% and industry up 1.5%. President-elect José Antonio Kast, due to take office on 11 March, has pledged to implement deregulation, fiscal discipline and corporate tax cuts to boost growth from 2.5% to 4% a year, though unemployment remains above 8% (its pre-pandemic level) and public debt is approaching its 1980s high.

Colombia faced persistent inflationary pressures, prompting its central bank, BanRep, to raise rates by 100 bps to 10.25% after five consecutive "hold" decisions. The split decision (four votes to two, with one abstention) came against the backdrop of a 23% increase in the minimum wage and a tug of war between Ecopetrol and the tax authorities over VAT. The latest El Tiempo poll put left-wing candidate Iván Cepeda in the lead with 34% of voting intentions versus right-wing candidate Abelardo de la Espriella, but there are still a lot of undecided voters ahead of the March primaries.

Across emerging markets as a whole, exchange rates and local interest rates remained stubbornly high. We have maintained our overweight in Latin America, combining it with a cautious portfolio allocation. The "Americas First" shift and the Donroe doctrine favour a constructive scenario for Latin America. Overall, the asset class remains attractive from a risk/reward perspective. Continued USD weakness should benefit local currency emerging debt.

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Glossary

ALPHA	Alpha is equal to the average return on the product, i.e. the value added by the manager after deducting market influences over which the manager has no control. This calculation is expressed as a percentage.	BETA	Beta is an indicator of a fund's sensitivity relative to its benchmark. A fund with a beta of less than 1 is likely to fall less than its benchmark, while a fund with a beta of greater than 1 is likely to fall further than its benchmark.	RECOVERY PERIOD	The recovery period (expressed in days) is the number of days needed to recoup the losses incurred after a maximum loss is sustained. Maximum loss is the largest loss the fund has experienced.
AVERAGE SPREAD	A fund's average spread is the average yield spread between the bonds held by the fund and a benchmark (often government bonds). It reflects the amount of risk taken by the fund relative to securities considered risk-free.	SRI	The SRI (Synthetic Risk Indicator) provides an assessment of the product's risk relative to that of other products. It indicates the probability of the product incurring losses in the event of market movements or of us not being able to pay you. SIX FINANCIAL STAR RATING	The rating is based on the analysis of the return and risk of each fund within its Europerformance category, using a minimum three-year track record. A score is calculated by comparing the fund's performance and volatility with those of its category index, and then converted into a number of stars according to a quintile ranking. A "junior" rating is applied to funds with a two- to three-year history, by linking their performance to their category index to reach the required three years.
