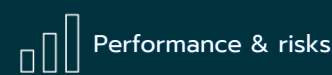

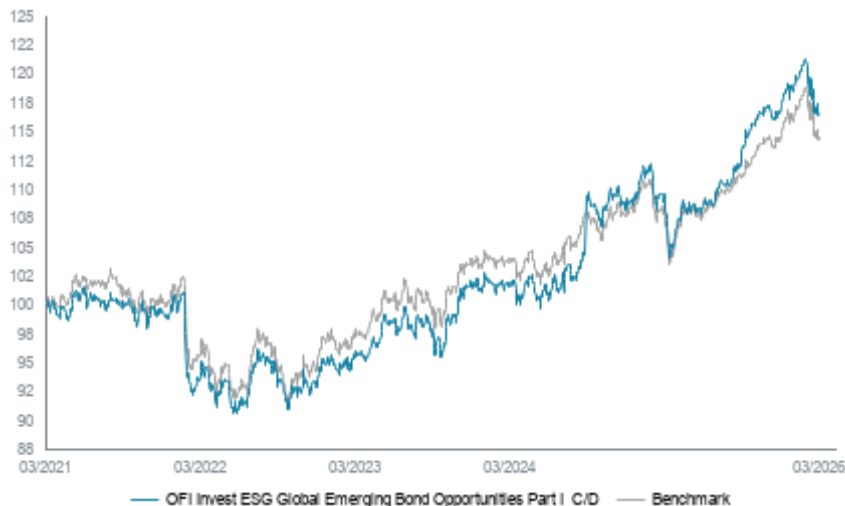
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▶ Performance over time⁽¹⁾ (base: 100 at 03/31/2021)

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▶ Investment commentary

OFI Invest ESG Global Emerging Bond Opportunities lost 3.83% in March, mainly as a result of risk aversion connected with the war in Iran and the strength of the US dollar. Most emerging markets lost ground, with the exception of Colombia, Brazil and China, which benefited from higher oil prices and their geographical distance from the conflict in the Middle East.

Latin American central banks adopted clearly divergent monetary policies in response to the energy shock. Brazil's central bank cut the Selic rate by 25 bps to 14.75%, while the Bank of Mexico made a similar 25 bps cut to 6.75% and issued particularly accommodative forward guidance hinting at further cuts to come. Conversely, the Central Bank of Chile held interest rates unchanged at 4.5%, adopting a hawkish stance whereby it explicitly saw oil price shocks as a key driver of higher inflation in Q3.

The Colombian political landscape changed considerably after the latest CNC/Cambio poll showed that Paloma Valencia had surged to 22.2% and secured a clear second place, bringing the combined share of non-Cepeda candidates in the first round to 41.2%, compared with 34.5% for Cepeda, and strengthening her odds in predictive markets. Furthermore, a US investigation into alleged links between Petro's campaign funding and drug traffickers puts his chosen successor at early risk of a media backlash.

An explosion on 1 March on the Camisea gas pipeline in Peru – which carries almost all domestic natural gas from one of the largest deposits in South America – triggered a 14-day national state of emergency, the suspension of supplies to allow repairs to be undertaken and rationing to prioritise households, electricity and transport. Long queues formed at filling stations in Lima, highlighting Peru's extreme reliance on this single gas pipeline linking the Amazon to the coast, and causing severe economic strain.

Energy supply disruptions stemming from the Iran conflict hit Asia hardest due to rising Middle East oil premiums, deepening current account deficits for importing countries such as India, the Philippines, Thailand and Indonesia – triggering fiscal subsidies, rationing and monetary tightening – while, for net exporters like Malaysia, their effects were partially offset. The CEEMEA and LatAm regions experienced more pronounced growth and inflation shocks as well as exchange rate pressures in energy-dependent economies (Poland, Romania, Turkey), in contrast to beneficiaries such as Russia, Brazil and South Africa.

Against this backdrop, the macroeconomic environment, buoyed by higher oil prices, structurally favours exposure to Latin America. The fund is well placed to benefit from this dynamic, with a 7% overweight in Latin America and a 17% underweight in Asia relative to its benchmark. This positioning reflects our belief that the region stands to benefit disproportionately from higher energy prices thanks to improved terms of trade, stronger sovereign balance sheets and relatively flexible monetary policy – and that it remains a key driver of portfolio construction as we navigate a more complex and volatile global environment.

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Glossary

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ALPHA	Alpha is equal to the average return on the product, i.e. the value added by the manager after deducting market influences over which the manager has no control. This calculation is expressed as a percentage.	BETA	Beta is an indicator of a fund's sensitivity relative to its benchmark. A fund with a beta of less than 1 is likely to fall less than its benchmark, while a fund with a beta of greater than 1 is likely to fall further than its benchmark.	RECOVERY PERIOD	The recovery period (expressed in days) is the number of days needed to recoup the losses incurred after a maximum loss is sustained. Maximum loss is the largest loss the fund has experienced.
AVERAGE SPREAD	A fund's average spread is the average yield spread between the bonds held by the fund and a benchmark (often government bonds). It reflects the amount of risk taken by the fund relative to securities considered risk-free.	SRI	The SRI (Synthetic Risk Indicator) provides an assessment of the product's risk relative to that of other products.
